CCRC helps build the capacity of childcare professionals with comprehensive coaching and professional development opportunities and provide support to businesses as they manage the challenges associated with their employees' childcare needs and its effect on business productivity. Child Care Resource Center serves 9 counties including Alleghany, Ashe, Davie, Davidson, Forsyth, Stokes, Surry, Wilkes and Yadkin.

To ensure quality learning experiences for every child in our community, Child Care Resource Center educates the community about quality child care while advocating for a comprehensive, high-quality early childhood delivery system, pay equity and benefits for early childhood professionals and policies that support family choice and empowering families to make informed decisions about quality child and family care.

National research and trends show that more than 70% of young children between ages birth to 5 are not in licensed care. These children are being cared for by a family, friend, or neighbor. "Kinship Caregivers or Family, Friend and Neighbor Caregiver (FFN)" as they are called, are adults who care for young children either in the child's home or in their home. They are the Family member grandparent, relative, sibling; or the Friend – friends keeping each other children; or the Neighbor - the neighbor who lives in the neighborhood and keeps children at their home who everybody knows and is affordable but isn't a licensed provider.

Many families choose "FFN" form of care for several reasons including, but not limited to --the high cost of licensed childcare, safety concerns, culture, personal relationship with the caregiver and work schedules. Recognizing that the Caregiver plays a very important role in the early brain development of the young child, CCRC is using various curriculums, tools, strategies to introduce strategies, information, and activities on how to keep the child engaged and help the child's learning while they have them.

CCRC applied for and received a grant from the Kate B. Reynolds Charitable Trust to explore ways to reach out to the growing community of "FFN Caregivers". CCRC is using several approaches in order to connect this very important to provide materials, books,

for more! In the class, the Caregiver is reminded of how important their relationship with the young child is and the impact of that relationship on the child's learning. More often than not, Caregivers -Grandparents, Godparents, Best Friends and the Neighborhood Momma believe they are just keeping children clean, safe and fed. But, they are also impacting what the child is learning, how much they are learning and when they are learning. Today it's not enough to put them on an iPad with ABC Mouse, there must be conversations with the child to build language skills, puzzles to build cognitive (brain) skills, music and movement for gross motor skills, painting, drawing, cutting with scissors for fine




